May Worship

Right after Easter, one of my church musician friends had this as his Facebook status: "Friends, Easter is a season, a full fifty days long. The season of Easter is to the year what Sunday is to the week. Today, Easter is not over; it is just beginning. And we Christians have now 49 more days to celebrate! Bring it!"

Indeed, the season of Easter is always a bit of a challenge to the church musician. How do we carry that resurrection joy forward for seven Sundays? Last year, a brass ensemble helped us celebrate the Easter season on most Sundays. This year's celebration is more eclectic.



May 3: The well-known and much-loved trio of Tim Gustafson, Mark Nelson, and Paul Odenbach will play for worship at the 10:30 service, including a church take on the famous Dave Brubeck tune "Take Five". Hope Choir will also have a new Gospel anthem to share.

May 10: University Lutheran Church of Hope has many musically talented high school seniors graduating this year. We thought Mother's Day would be an appropriate day to showcase this talent. Our worship will feature our young musicians playing instruments in solos, small ensembles, and with our hymnody.

May 17: The Hope Choir and Festival Choir will sing Mozart's *Missa Brevis in C Major* (K220, "Sparrow Mass") at the 10:30 service, with a small orchestra. Mozart was 19 years old when he wrote this piece, and his youthful exuberance shows. Come to experience a little bit of Austria!

May 24: Pentecost. We celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit onto the disciples and the birthday of the Church. We begin our summer worship schedule of one service at 10 a.m.

May 31: Trinity Sunday. On the official day to celebrate Pastor Craig Shirley's retirement, (he'll still be here a few more Sundays), we'll have a big festival service at 10 a.m. with brass and timpani. Stick around for the dinner!

Treasurer's Report for March 2015

March giving was \$40,143.48 and our rental income was \$9,977.24, for a total income of \$50,120.72. Our rental income was \$1,386.10 over budget and our giving was \$3,077.15 over budget. Total income was \$4,463.25 over budget.

Our expenses for March were \$58,217.66. Our budget for March expenses was \$45,480.09, which put us over budget by \$12,737.57. This month reflects costs incurred to refinance our mortgage and pay down the principal balance. We will pay out an additional amount for principal reduction in April. Our new mortgage with the Mission Investment fund is for \$1.25M vs. the \$1.31M before refinancing. Our net income was (\$8,096.94). Our mortgage payment decreased from \$13,448.00 per month to \$11,237.00 per month, for a savings of \$2,221.00 per month. The term of our mortgage has stayed the same at 12 years.

Thank you again, for your gifts financially, and in all the other ways you contribute to the life and health of this congregation, as it serves the community here in Southeast Minneapolis, and around the world. It is wonderful to see our members contribute not just their financial resources, but all of the volunteer hours that make this congregation a vibrant and thoughtful presence in the community.

Total income for Hope for the Future campaign in March was \$7,340.28. Thank you once again to all of you who pledged to the Hope for the Future campaign. Total Pledges to date are approximately \$389,000.00. We were able to pay down \$60,000.00 of our mortgage balance with \$30,000.00 coming from our Building Fund and \$30,000.00 from the General Fund.

In March we paid out \$36,918.89 for the mortgage and received \$209.16 for building improvements from PEASE Academy. Our total expense was \$36,709.73. Net income was (\$29,369.45). Our building fund balance is \$279,662.29.

Shirley's Share

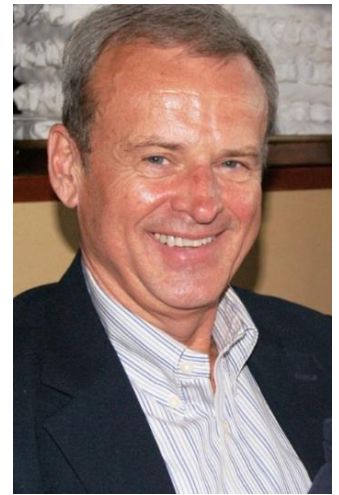
Not too many years ago the process of calling a new pastor was quite different. A call committee would show up at another church on a Sunday morning in order to “scout out” a candidate. I remember my home pastor saying, “It isn’t a coincidence when four people show up at your worship service, sitting in different places, but all sharing that they are from the same community when you greet them at the door afterwards.”

In those days, a pastor would simply receive a Call. It might come in person. It might come in the mail. But the Call was what got the whole process going. It was at that point that the pastoral candidate would begin conversation with a congregation as to whether or not he (they were all men in those days) would or would not accept the call. There were no interims. There were no multiple candidates. It was less businesslike, and more dependent on the Spirit.

So, in a way, the process we are going through here at University Lutheran Church of Hope is kind of a throwback. There will probably not be an interim pastor here for two, three, or six months or a year. Instead, I will retire and the new pastor will (at least if everything goes as planned) take over. This may be exciting for some and downright shocking for others, which is why I am writing about it this month in *The Visitor*.

If you remember my three-month sabbatical, you will remember that Pastor Chris Scharen took over as pastor during my time away, right in the midst of Holy Week! It seemed to me that most everyone enjoyed Pastor Scharen’s time here, that people quickly got used to his way of doing things, and that many people stepped up, not only to welcome him, but also to help him get integrated into our congregational life.

I trust that will happen again when your new pastor is called. I trust that you folks will welcome that person, that you will give that person some time to get settled and begin to understand “the lay of the land.” I trust that you will embrace that person’s gifts for ministry, and step up to help lead the congregation with the skills and talents that you have. I trust that some of you may challenge the new person with variations on the phrase, “We’ve never done it that way before.” But that, of course, is one of the exciting things about having a new person in place – new face, new ideas, new way of doing things. It will be a shock for everyone, including the new person you call to lead you. So have patience! Use humor to move ahead. And welcome the new person with open hearts and the grace that God shows us every day! Alleluia! Christ is Risen!

Godly Play

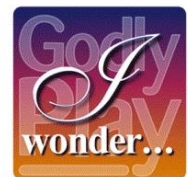

John Scheck, Warehouse/Volunteer Manager at GHM, will speak about the shipping program and volunteer opportunities at GHM. Global Health Ministries is a Christian movement proclaiming the gospel by carrying on the healing ministry of our Lord Jesus in the developing world. Most recently, GHM was among the first organizations to respond to the Ebola crisis by gathering and shipping supplies and equipment to fight the spread of this disease. Global Health Ministries continues the holistic ministry of Jesus Christ by partnering with Lutheran efforts globally to enhance and sustain the health and well-being of the communities served.



You are invited to join Global Health Ministries through support of the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria Health Programs, sustaining support of the Kairos Mission Appeal, or adoption of one of the more than 60 approved projects to improve the health of the poor around the world. Facilities News

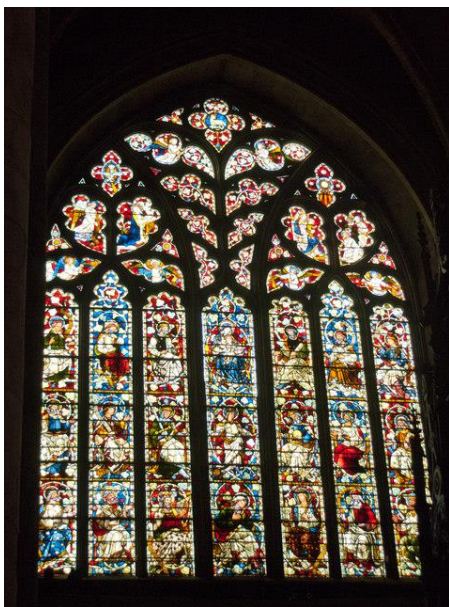
We are currently pursuing bids to replace the Chapel roof. The work will be done this summer or fall if all goes well. Roof drainage and runoff will be addressed as well, with the possibility of adding a rain garden to handle the additional water. Look for updates in the near future.

The stained glass in the sanctuary needs some attention. We are looking into a pilot project by some volunteers within our congregation to rehabilitate the small windows. Also, the exterior coverings of the large stained glass windows need to be replaced, so we're gathering information on those as well.

The Youth Room will undergo a makeover this spring with funding provided by PEASE Academy. This project includes paint, carpeting, lighting, and furniture to make the room more comfortable, inviting, and functional. We anticipate that this project will be completed before summer arrives.

“Hope for the Future” Mission Appeal Report

The results are in, and our efforts have paid off. Our “Hope for the Future” mission appeal generated pledges in the amount of approximately \$385,000 for the coming three-year period, over \$100,000 of which is already now deposited into our accounts. Pledges were made by 78 family units from University Lutheran Church of Hope, and include 30 congregational leaders and staff who stepped forward as lead donors.

These results were well above the Vision & Governance Board’s baseline goal. The Board was able to refinance our mortgage with the ELCA’s Mission Investment Fund, pay down the principle by \$60,000, and cut our annual payments by over \$20,000/year over the remaining 12 years of the loan. We will also be able to pay our usual benevolence, replace the Thorpe Chapel roof this summer and the roof over the Education Wing within the next two years, and have significant additional funds to sustain and beautify our buildings and facilities in coming years.

I want to thank each one of you for your role in helping us meet the Hope for the Future challenge in such a strong fashion. I would also like to acknowledge the committee members who led the effort: Tim Abrahamson, Jack Dant, Mark Nelson, Sonya Peterson, Jim Solem, and Ron Sorensen. Also, keep in mind that if you have not yet made a pledge, it is not too late! We will gladly accept any and all pledges and contributions in coming months and throughout the life of the campaign.

President's Perspective

We are entering the final stretch! Over a year ago, we embarked on a congregational journey. At that time, our leaders knew there were some big challenges and changes ahead, but it wasn't yet clear how we would navigate through them or where we would ultimately end up. With the help of Kairos, we underwent a self-study to determine what we hold dear as members of University Lutheran Church of Hope and to envision what our mission in the coming years might be. With a clearer vision of who we are, and renewed energy to dream of our future together, we conducted a highly successful capital campaign and mission appeal. While most pledges will be paid out over a three-year period, one-third of the total pledges were paid in cash up front. With the influx of \$129,000, we were able to pay down part of the mortgage principle. By refinancing the mortgage at a lower interest rate, we will also save \$24,000 a year for the remaining life of the loan.

Completing a self-study and getting our financial house in order are valuable exercises for a congregation. Also, as we were advised by our consultants from Kairos, it positions us well for the invitation to a new pastor. As a member of the call committee, I can say that several of our candidates did ask questions during the interview about our debt and the status of the capital campaign. The committee was overjoyed to answer these questions with positive examples of the mortgage refinance and generous pledges from so many members!

In our journey, we have reached the third major milestone: preparing for the transition of pastoral leadership and care. The call committee has been working since late November and hopes to recommend a final candidate in May. Pastor Shirley has graciously delayed his retirement to accommodate our call process, but the time has come for him to make more concrete plans for his own transition. He and the Vision & Governance Board have set the following dates for the congregation to celebrate his ministry and bid farewell:

- Following the 10 a.m. worship service on Sunday, May 31, there will be a "Celebration of Ministry" party for Pastor Craig Shirley, including a catered meal and special program.
- He will wrap up his work during the first two weeks of June.
- He will lead his final worship service with us on Sunday, June 14 at 10 a.m.

We hope that you will be able to attend one or both of these special events in the life of Pastor Shirley and the congregation.

A HUGE thank you to our treasurer, Tim Abrahamson, for shepherding us through the refinancing of the mortgage. He negotiated with different lenders; provided the Vision & Governance Board with multiple scenarios and options; managed all the paperwork, deadlines, and collection of signatures; and even went downtown last week to file the papers with Hennepin County.
