Assisting the Communion of Saints

I first *served* communion as an adult. It changed my life. Until then, communion did not make a great deal of sense to me; it didn't seem like it was supposed to. In the mystery of the sacrament, the bread and wine were both bread and wine and the body and blood of Jesus, as long as I had faith that they were. That mystery seemed like it was something between Christ and me.



That first time I served communion, though, all these other people came into view: the Sunday School teacher for whom I didn't behave, the young adults group member who asked hard questions, my mother's circle members. All came forward with their hands out. Into those hands I placed a tiny wafer or bit of bread. There was some kind of binding spirit at work in the sharing of bread. I had missed a big part of the mystery. Someone had told me about the communion of saints, but serving communion meant I could glimpse it.

Participation in leading worship has become a tradition at Hope. Adults and children volunteer as assisting ministers, choir members, communion servers, lectors, and ushers. They remind us that worship is not a spectator sport but a gathering of God's active saints around the shared Word and Sacraments. Children can begin ushering beside their parents in their preschool years, become lectors and acolytes as they grow, and learn to be assisting ministers as youth. As we commit to re-invigorating our worship together, we want children and adults to be present and excited to participate in all of these important leadership roles. For example, although acolytes have traditionally been of middle school age, we're pretty sure that adults can serve competently and reverently as acolytes. I am an assisting minister who has added "acolyte" to the list of roles on the Ministry Scheduler Pro that I'm willing to take. I hope that other assisting ministers and former acolytes will do the same, and that all our worshippers will consider signing up for new leadership roles.

Treasurer's Report for September 2015

September giving was \$36,440.16 and rental income was \$5,692.14 for a total income of \$42,132.30, up 3.25% from August. Rental income was \$1,435.86 under budget and giving was \$276.17 under budget. Total income was \$1,712.13 under budget. We are \$9,463.80 under budget for the year to date, down 2.4%. Our expenses in September were \$26,998.03. The budget for September expenses was \$43,319.86 which put us under budget by \$16,321.83. \$10,635.33 of this expense amount was for an AC unit for rooms #201/202. This amount was reimbursed by the capital fund and will be repaid monthly to ULCH by PEASE Academy. This transaction skews our numbers significantly for the month. Our net income for September was \$14,609.80. Our net income for the year to date is \$5,041.05. Thank you again, for your gifts financially, and in all the other ways you contribute to the life and health of this congregation, as it serves the community here in Southeast Minneapolis, and around the world. It is wonderful to see our members contribute not just their financial resources, but all of the volunteer hours that make this congregation a vibrant and thoughtful presence in the community.

We also want our youth to be able to choose the worship leadership roles that matter most to them. Once people learn how to serve in a role, we hope they will continue to find the experience rewarding. Serving in any leadership role, ideally learning to do them all, can fulfill your Confirmation service requirement. But we no longer have an end date of Confirmation for service as acolytes or in other roles. We don't want to lose our experienced worship leaders. We need you.

If you are a child or adult who wants to learn the acolyte role of carrying fire, receiving the gifts of the congregation, handling holy vessels, and catching a glimpse of the communion of saints, please email me at education@ulch.org and let me know. I'll schedule a practice time with you. We also hope to schedule practice sessions for other roles soon.

Igniting Our Life Together

Last winter and spring as the call committee and I entered into conversations, more than once I asked what they were looking for in their new pastor. The response that arose most often was something like: we want someone to light us on fire. They weren't sure exactly what that would look like (the person, I presumed, and also the igniting) but they searched for language to articulate a wise sense that had settled deeply into them as individuals and as a group of leaders. Now, talk of fire makes the insurance company nervous. And, talk of asking a person to ignite such a metaphorical fire makes said pastor nervous. The truth that the call committee and I both knew was that some sort of spirited energy was needed, but that such fire and energy best arises within a congregation, among leaders, pastors, and the whole community, and it is Holy Spirit initiated.



As early conversations became votes, and good, hard decisions, the call committee and I continued this conversation about fire and, indeed, transformation. Is this congregation really ready for change?

As I've joined you all in ministry, the answer has been confirmed time and again. You are ready. Of course, some struggle and grief will be part of the process—that's normal—and even some anxiety, for change is hard and we hold fast to what we know best. But still, overwhelmingly, I sense your readiness. Last year during the capital campaign process you worked diligently in preparation. This fall already the Vision and Governance Board has met in retreat to deepen our leadership and then to clarify vision goals for the coming years. On page 10 our congregational president, Beth Kautz, writes about this process and shares the vision goals that have arisen. Please take time to read Beth's article. These goals include connecting with the university and the community, igniting worship and spirituality, and revitalizing our ministry with youth and children. In many ways they are quite natural:

- We are named *University* Lutheran Church of Hope. We want to thoroughly re-engage with our neighborhood and the university setting, including working on our relationship with Lutheran Campus Ministry and our role in this vital ministry. This image of having “porous” walls helps me.
- We already value worship highly, but last year's CAT survey indicated lower energy and lower spirituality. Entering into transformation and working together on these goals while also opening ways to deepen our engagement with worship and spirituality will address this.
- With Diane Shallue's retirement, we're at a good time to reassess how we do ministry with both children and youth. Clearly this is a value for the congregation but in changing times and demographics *how* it is lived out can take many forms. We're already in conversation with a group called *Interserve* that will likely be able to help us work through this wisely and make decisions for staffing and programs. Diane blessed us with good organization; our thanks to the dedicated volunteers who carry out the children's faith formation during these in-between times.

In this season of All Saints, as we light candles remembering those whose faith inspires and ignites our faith, I'm so grateful for this community here at University Lutheran Church of Hope. God is up to something and the Holy Spirit is at work in and through you already; the fires of our life together are growing. I invite you into daily prayer (that the Holy Spirit will ignite our life together) and into deep and honest conversation about each of these goals.

Faith Formation for All Ages on Sunday Mornings

November 22: Giving Voice Chorus: Enjoy a presentation by Marge and Anna Ostroushko. Launched in the fall of 2014, Giving Voice Chorus creates an opportunity for people in our community living with Alzheimer's Disease to join with their care partners as a choral ensemble to connect through the power of music. Co-founders Mary Lenard and Marge Ostroushko were struck by recent discoveries about the powerful effects of music on the lives of people with dementia, especially the finding that individuals with Alzheimer's are able to sing and enjoy music even as their disease progresses, especially if they sing familiar music. Giving Voice performs old and new favorites, from traditional folk music to show tunes, rock-and-roll oldies and pop songs.

One goal of the chorus is to enrich the relationships between the person with dementia and family caregivers, friends, and children. Marge Ostroushko, a member of University Lutheran Church of Hope and co-founder of the Giving Voice Chorus, was inspired by her mother, Jean, who lives with Alzheimer's disease and who loves to sing. In her 25 years as a radio and events producer, Marge has lent her talents to some of public radio's most loved shows, including *A Prairie Home Companion*, *This American Life*, and *Speaking of Faith*. Currently, Marge works as the station relations manager for *This American Life*, and the marketing director and strategist for numerous other national public radio programs.

President's Perspective

The Vision and Governance Board devoted its October 3 retreat to forming our vision for the coming years. We began by affirming the core values of the congregation, values we first articulated at our June 2014 retreat. We then reviewed the top 3 priorities based on the CAT survey and thought about each one in terms of our strengths and weaknesses, and the opportunities and threats each poses. We shared with each other why we are part of this congregation and what our hearts long for. We looked at city maps to discussed the concept of neighborhood or parish and how we might engage more with university students. Finally, we each named several ideas or projects for the coming year. Together, we sorted them into three major areas to form our vision for ministry.

What you read below is a vision for ministry that will ignite our life together. We are a thoughtful church in a complex world. Our three areas of focus cannot be delegated to a particular committee or remain compartmentalized within one ministry area. As a congregation, we need to embrace these challenges from multiple perspectives and look for connections among them. May the fire within us burn bright!

Igniting Our Life Together

1. Connecting with the University and the Community

Goal: *Engage the surrounding neighborhoods. Make our walls "porous".*

This includes building relationships with community organizations such as neighborhood associations, PEASE, and the Dinkytown Business Alliance; advocating for justice and exploring service needs in the neighborhood such as a food shelf and recovery groups; and improving signage, outdoor lighting, and our communication strategy and forms.

Goal: *Make University Lutheran Church of Hope a place where Lutheran Campus Ministry happens.*

This includes increasing our visibility specifically with students, re-visioning our partnership with Lutheran Campus Ministry, and working on collaborative programming with other religious communities.

2. Igniting Worship, Deepening Spirituality

Goal: *Work to create more varied and participatory worship experiences, while honoring our liturgical Lutheran tradition.*

This could include alternate worship times, places and formats, as well as greater creativity through drama and various other forms of artistic expression.

Goal: *Encourage greater participation in and offer more opportunities to learn, discuss, connect, share, explore, study the Bible, and express our faith together.*

This might include expanding some small group encounters to ensure a deep and rich experience for all participants.

3. Revitalizing our Ministry with Youth and Children

Goal: *Explore where we can go with this ministry and how it can be staffed.*

This would likely involve the assistance of an organization such as *Interserve*. We need to explore questions such as: How can we be a church that makes room for children and youth in worship and in the life of the community? What do we do about youth who are just not interested?
