

Treasurer's Report for October 2015

October giving was \$33,311.99 and our rental income was \$5,430.59, for total income of \$38,742.58. Our rental income was \$1,297.41 under budget and our giving was \$3,504.34 under budget. Total income was \$4,801.75 under budget. We are \$14,265.55 under budget for the year to date, down 3.2% from projections. Our expenses for October were \$47,545.38. Our budget for October expenses was \$55,238.86, which put us under budget by \$7,693.48 (we spent less than we budgeted for the month). Our net income (income minus expense) for October was (\$8,802.80) (our expenses were greater than our income). Our net income for the year to date is (\$3,761.75); we budgeted net income to be (\$15,685.78). We are doing better than projected, but have spent \$3,761.75 more than our total income to date. This is less than a 1% differential between income and expense.

Thank you again, for your gifts financially, and in all the other ways you contribute to the life and health of this congregation, as it serves the community here in Southeast Minneapolis, and around the world. It is wonderful to see our members contribute not just their financial resources, but all of the volunteer hours that make this congregation a vibrant and thoughtful presence in the community.

Total income for Hope for the Future capital campaign in October was \$6,225.48. In October we paid out \$6,918.89 for the mortgage and \$23,247.00 for a new roof over the chapel. Net income was \$23,940.41. Our building fund balance is \$256,851.13.

Note: If you were present at the financial update meeting in October, a question was raised about the graph that I presented. The 1st quarter income on the graph did not truly reflect actual income; it only included the giving portion and did not include the rental portion.

Numerical values on item #1 for 1st and 2nd quarters were also incorrect: 1st quarter income was under budget by (\$1,643) not (\$2,356) as reported and 2nd quarter income was over budget by \$2,107 not \$471 as reported. The remaining numbers are correct. I apologize for my error and thank James Flaten for pointing out my discrepancy. Thank you for your patience and understanding. Meek and mild? Or, a revolutionary in our midst? My vote for “Important Advent character” has so often gone to John the Baptist. There’s just something about that scraggly fellow and his locusts and honey, the street corner preacher with orange crate in hand unplugged in the wilderness, crying out, “Repent. Prepare the way of the Lord. Make God’s path straight.” Most years John the Baptist gets my vote.

But this year? This year, I’m thinking about Mary. Each Wednesday evening of Advent we’ll sing Mary’s *Magnificat*, a staple of Holden Evening Prayer. Whether on the 3rd or 4th Sundays of Advent, Mary’s song will be one of our lessons.

So often we picture Mary as meek and mild, clad in pale blue, a passive vessel. Take some time this year to read again (more than once, perhaps daily) Mary’s *Magnificat* in Luke 1:46-55. To be blunt, she’s not so meek and mild. She’s daring and bold: “My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior.” For what God is doing *in* her and *through* her, and what God is doing for the lowly, she is in awe and not afraid to say it. This God, she sings, scatters the proud, brings down the powerful, lifts up the lowly, fills the hungry, and keeps ancient promises. No wonder Jesus talks like he does. Perhaps her words in Luke are enlivened by those of Hannah (1 Samuel 2) so long before. Perhaps Mary’s energy is bolstered by the visit with Elizabeth. Regardless, her song is full of strength and love.

She’s a revolutionary. She doesn’t just birth the Christ child; she brings to life—literally—the promises of our God who is doing a new thing, an incarnate thing, and a turn-the-world-upside-down thing. God is filling the hungry and tumbling the usual power structures. And it’s Mary who names it. Mary not-so-meek-and-mild. Mary the revolutionary, strong and loving and fearless. While I hope we heed John’s call to repentance, I don’t expect you’ll take up locusts. I do, however, hope and pray that we can be a bit more like Mary this season: strong and loving and fearless. May Mary’s words fill and inspire you as we wait for the birth of the Christ Child. May you be a humble revolutionary, raising kids or caring for a friend, challenging the powers or loving the earth. Faith Formation for All Ages on Sunday Mornings

Music Focus: The Children's Ministry Team has added more music to the children's program on Sunday mornings this year. Singing connects to our spiritual selves in new ways. Godly Play students will have music time once a month. Creation Stations students will have music every Sunday beginning at 9:15 a.m. Once a month the Creation Stations music time will be extended to the full period with time to play Orff and other rhythm instruments, led by Rosalie Eldevik.

Godly Play

Classes for children ages three through six are held on Sunday mornings in room 103. Godly Play creates sacred space to hear and learn Bible stories using objects and play. Students and teachers wonder together and then children are encouraged to respond to the stories on their own terms using art materials. The structure of the Godly Play lesson models worship, with: Gathering Time, Hearing the Story/Word, Response Time/Offering, and Feast/Communion. Teachers are Madhu Bhat and Sara Tufvesson Doure. December 6, 13, and 20: Handel's *Messiah* – The Music and Text: A study led by John Setterlund.

Messiah is one of only two of Handel's 18 oratorios that consists entirely of biblical verses. It is therefore not overtly dramatic, but rather meditative. The text itself is a broad selection of Old and New Testament verses, lifted out of their contexts and applied to Jesus, although he is never named. Handel's music for soloists, chorus, and instruments ingeniously expresses the meaning and emotional impact of the text, becoming popular and enduring from the time of its composition in 1742 to the 21st Century. The three parts of the *Messiah* will be discussed at the Adult Forums on December 6, 13, and 20, respectively.



John Setterlund, a retired ELCA pastor and missionary, is a life-long student of Baroque music, and has directed and sung *Messiah* many times. He performed with and served on the Board of Baroque Artists of Champaign-Urbana (Illinois), and is an honorary member. He is presently singing in the University Lutheran Church of Hope Choir.


Mount Carmel Winter Retreat

President's Perspective

Since becoming congregational president last February, I can't say there has really been any "slow time" – a time when you can relax a bit and just let things follow their normal course. Although it has felt like a whirlwind at times, we have been forging a path. As I reflect on just the past 4-6 weeks, I feel good about our progress: we aren't just plowing ahead, but rather strategically moving forward. Let me share with you some highlights.

Since establishing our three vision areas in early October, we've taken the following actions:

Connecting with the University and Community: Four Hope leaders, Pastor Jen, and our two congregational representatives on the Lutheran Campus Ministry Board (John Bablitch and John Setterlund) participated in the triennial review of LCM at the U of M. We met with LCM board members, leaders from Grace University Lutheran Church, and representatives from LCM programs beyond our local area to talk about the strengths of the current program and how we can collaborate more in the future. The Vision & Governance Board also voted to financially support LCM through a benevolence donation in 2016 of 0.5% of our budget. LCM is an independent organization that is no longer funded by the ELCA, but rather relies on grants and donations by congregations and individuals.

Igniting Worship, Deepening Spirituality: A new worship planning process has been created to ignite deeper participation, engagement, and corporate ownership of our worship at Hope. Under the guidance of a 5-member Worship Planning Team, there will be free-form worship planning workshops open to all to generate ideas and practices for our worship together. Look for more information soon!

Revitalizing our Ministry with Children and Youth: We have asked InterServe Ministries to lead us through a 6-month discovery process to determine how we can best minister to children, youth, and families in our changing congregational landscape and neighborhood. At the end of 6 months, they will provide a report, recommendations, and suggested next steps to implement and staff this ministry.

Other committees of the congregation are also taking action. The Financial Controls Committee is organizing a "Financial Control Check-up" with a certified public accounting firm. The Leadership Development Team is reaching out to congregational members, asking them to serve in important board and committee positions in 2016. The Hope Church Trust and the Vision & Governance Board are taking steps to improve communication with each other as we plan to continue the vibrant ministries and faithful stewardship of this congregation. Finally, the Executive Committee is assembling the 2016 budget for approval in January by the Vision & Governance Board and to be voted on by the congregation on February 7, 2016. What an exciting time to be part of this community!
