## Drivers' Licenses for Immigrants in Minnesota

We have an opportunity to restore access to drivers' licenses for our immigrant neighbors this coming legislative session. There are many issues on the table in 2019, and some things will be left behind; this issue has been identified by our immigrant leaders as the top priority. Many of us take our licenses for granted, but consider the implications for families and workers. Imagine the fear every time you get behind the wheel to drive your kids to school or to visit family in the hospital. You aren't even able to return something to Target without a license. Denying drivers' licenses to our undocumented neighbors (approx. 100,000 individuals in Minnesota) makes the roads less safe for everyone. If you don't have access to a license, you also don't have access to the testing and education that every Minnesotan who drives is expected to complete. Many of you have already committed to visiting your state representatives about this issue, and I encourage you to keep talking to friends, family, and neighbors about this important topic. # Arise, Shine!

Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

Isaiah 60:1)

This is the way our first reading begins on Epiphany, January 6. It's the start of a season of revelation. Things that once were hidden are being made known. By the star, the Magi find the Christ Child. In the river, Jesus is named Beloved. By the ancient words, Jesus' call of liberation is made public. By the sea, would-be followers are called ... and in our uncertainty we find courage.



Over the last months, our congregation has teamed up to apply for a number of grants. Many of these have been mentioned in passing, but their focus can be confusing. Today I'm naming these grants and sharing a bit about each. Grants help us make things known that we may not otherwise have the resources for. They stretch our capacity and enhance our ministry... not just within our walls, but in our neighborhood, and far beyond. I'm grateful for a bunch of people (lay leaders, staff, ministry partners in other congregations) who've had the vision to see what we can do together for the glory of God and the liberation of our world.

You'll notice that three of them are Ministry Imagination Grants. The Minneapolis Area Synod has received money from the sale of some church buildings, and divided it for a number of purposes. A portion is for Ministry Imagination Grants, small grants that further the gospel and encourage growth in faith or service.

**Expansive Language Liturgy.** Ministry Imagination Grant with Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Luther Seminary, St. Michael's Lutheran Church, and others, to create an expansive language (inclusive in language about God, humanity, creation, images, theologies) Lutheran liturgy. \$12,500 received.

**Gather: Feast. Pray. Rest.** Ministry Imagination Grant with Lutheran Campus Ministry and Grace University Lutheran Church to create metro-wide worship, fellowship, and retreat opportunities for young adults, especially young adults who are beyond our congregations and untethered (we're thinking especially about YAGM/LVC/LCM alums). We call this Gather; the first worship will be in April. \$15,000 received.

**Community Organizing Video Project.** Ministry Imagination Grant received by Nick Tangen and his peer group of community engagement staff to create videos about community organizing. \$10,000 received.

**Riverside Innovation Hub.** Augsburg University's Innovation Hub is funded by the Lilly Foundation; it makes a space to explore young adult ministry. Currently the funding provides a part-time coach (ours is Amanda Vetsch) who leads our Innovation Team (Will Heller, Erika Larson, Abby Lucas, Doug Hartmann, Kirsten Mebust, and Nick Tangen) through a process of listening and learning in our community. In the spring we can apply for a grant for a specific project.

**Dinkytown Farmers Market.** This past summer the mini-market received a grant from the city of Minneapolis to fund some of the market start up, especially buying the equipment needed to accept food assistance (SNAP and EBT cards).

**Hope Church Trust Grants.** Did you know that our congregation's endowment has given away more than \$200,000 since it began? The Trust is now accepting applications for grants. You are invited to apply.

Beloved Ones of God. Arise, shine, for your light has come. God's grace and glory are active in and through us. I give thanks for these grants and the gospel possibilities they reveal, and I give thanks for you. Epiphany Blessings.

**Jan. 6: Welcome the Refugees.** Margaret Yapp from the Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota Refugee Resettlement program will discuss the basics of resettlement, current challenges, and changes in the U.S. resettlement program. She will explain the services families receive once here, and how folks can get involved. On this Epiphany Sunday we will consider tangible ways to bring *light to the nations* in our world today.

November was another great month at University Lutheran Church of Hope! General Giving totaled \$45,686, an increase of almost 46% compared to November 2017. Although year to date, general giving is down 8% compared to the 2018 budget, it is up nearly \$60K (16%) from this time last year. Steady rental income contributed to a total income of \$57,967 for the month.

Expenses totaled \$51,182 for the month of November. Year to date, Hope has incurred \$584,153 in expenses, nearly 10% more than last year. We are closely managing our expenses while making strategic decisions on how our resources should be used for important things in the future. As a congregation we have been presented with opportunities to expand our ministry, including a pastoral intern, providing benefits to our staff, and conducting a church-wide information technology audit. The Vision & Governance Board was fully aware of the risk in accepting additional expenses, and felt confident in our financial position. We are confident that these incremental expenses are bettering our congregation and overall mission.

Net operating income was \$6,785 in November. Year to date, we have a net operating loss of just over \$30K, which is less than 5% of our total 2018 budget of \$644K.

The balance sheet is a snapshot of our financial position at a specific point in time. As of Nov. 30, we have nearly \$234K in current assets mainly comprising our checking and savings accounts. We continue to maintain a healthy balance sheet position.

Contributions to the Building Fund totaled just over \$11K for the month. After satisfying our mortgage obligation, we had a net income of approximately \$4.1K. We currently have \$129,493 in total assets for the Building Fund. We are looking forward to Year 2 of our capital campaign, Revealing Hope.

The Board is finalizing the 2019 budget. Thank you to everyone who completed a 2019 pledge card. Pledge cards were a fundamental component for building the 2019 budget. Please join me on Sunday, Feb. 3 for the 2019 budget presentation, just one week before the annual congregational meeting on Sunday, Feb. 10.

# President's Report

## Christmas Presents

Dec. 15, 2018

As I write this, a little more than a week before Christmas, most of us are spending at least some of our time thinking about Christmas presents. We participate in Secret Santa events at work, we have white elephant exchanges with friends, we share meaningful gifts with each other at worship, and we shop frantically to find the perfect something for those who are close to us. 'Tis the season.

By the time this edition of *The Visitor* reaches you, Christmas may well be a pleasant memory. But gift-giving season will not quite be over. After the first of the year—on Jan. 6—we will mark Epiphany, the day when tradition says the Magi arrived in Bethlehem from the East, bearing earthly treasures—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—to present to the Christ child.

Whenever I think of treasure, I cannot help but think of the words inscribed on a rustic wood lectern that stands on one side of the gymnasium at Holden Village—a space that serves as the setting for daily vespers during the summer months. Carved by the legendary St. Olaf College art professor Arnold Flaten and presented to the Holden community in the mid-1960s, the lectern bears a simple inscription: “We have this treasure.”

These words are excerpted from Paul's second letter to the church at Corinth (2 Corinthians 4:7-9). He is writing to a congregation that is struggling to comprehend and respond to the mystery of the Gospel. They are stung by Paul's rebuke in an earlier letter—a misstep that has soured his relationship with that church and that made the apostle realize his own shortcomings as a mentor. Confronting this reality, he finds comfort and strength from knowing that God has freed us all from the burden of guilt through the gift of Jesus Christ. Here's more of the passage:

“We have this treasure in clay jars, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed.”

In this one short statement, Paul acknowledges the human condition and makes it clear that we all exist in a state of grace, that grace comes from God, and that grace is freely given regardless of our human failings. What a wonderful, hopeful thing for us to know as we face the joys and challenges of a new year. What a gift! Blessings,
