Counting and Counted

As I walked in the early morning on a recent day, a clanging gate caught my attention. I was near the corner entrance to a large cemetery. Squinting into the hazy autumn light I could make out the shape of a person who had just pushed open the wrought iron gate, slipped in, and nestled into the quiet grassy spot against the big stone pillar from which the gate hangs. Perhaps they were unsheltered and looking for a safer spot to rest.



Just days before that, Ann Rolle, from our congregation, who had worked for the census, had told me about how over one night small teams fanned out around the city and state enumerating people. They didn't just enumerate those who live in houses or dorms or apartments, but also those who stay in shelters and under bridges, those sleeping in camps, lingering at bus stops, or resting on the train. "Enumerating," Ann had said, explaining that enumerating is a better word for the action of the census. For counting has so many meanings: to count, like 1, 2, 3; and to count, like to matter, to have value, meaning, worth.

Seeing the fellow in the cemetery that early morning, I wondered if he'd been enumerated by one of these census teams. Did he feel like he counted, like people knew him and valued him and cared? Like he had gifts and talents that the community needed? With my mind full of All Saints, I'm musing about both the living and the dead, those who have gone before us and are at rest, those with whom we currently live and move and have our being, and those who feel far away, whose ideas we may disagree with, even vehemently, and who God still claims in a wide mercy unfathomable to us mortals. Did this fellow resting in the morning light count? Was he counted? To God, surely he does count, and, yes, with God he is counted. To us, to our broken society, with COVID deaths ticking up daily, that's a harder question that begs our attention, particularly in light of the Gospel's call and the current times.

This year as we celebrate All Saints on November 1, I'm praying that you and that fellow and so many others know you count, that you hear again your beloved-ness in God's eyes, in Christ's heart. Between the quarantining of the pandemic, the mask wearing of precaution, the early snow of this fall, the divisiveness of this election, and the general crankiness of these times, it would be easy to forget this truth. So quickly we put on our blinders. We erect our walls. We let anxiety win the day.

On All Saints, at our best, we can light candles for the loves lost and the loves not yet, and we can give thanks for those who share this challenging season. We can remember how much people count. At Hope during the Zoom and live streamed service on November 1st, we'll be tolling the bell and naming our saints. Over All Saints weekend, stop by the sanctuary to light candles and pray and linger. The main sanctuary doors and the blue welcome center doors will be open to access the sanctuary on Saturday, Oct. 31 (9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.), Sunday, Nov. 1 (noon-3:00 p.m.), and Monday, Nov. 2 (9:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m.).

Worship and Music

November is a liminal season in the church year. The month begins with All Saints, when we lift into the church's communal memory and find ourselves in the wide circle of God's great cloud of witnesses. We then move swiftly toward the end of the church's calendar year on Reign of Christ Sunday only three weeks later. Our scripture turns to end times and signs of Christ's return. Then the last Sunday of the month is the first Sunday in Advent, when we go from ending to beginning. Eternity, shut in the span of a simple month. The river—of mercy, of time flowing on—flows from the throne of God. Alleluia.

Together we have built capacity for worshipping online over the span of the pandemic. In November, we have the opportunity and freedom to gather yet more frequently. We will observe All Saints online as usual on Sunday and offer the opportunity for safe in-person candle-lighting in our beautiful and holy sanctuary. Only days later, Election Day dawns. At what will be a tense and trepidatious time, we will turn to God in prayer for our nation. Monday night and Wednesday night of that first week of the month, we will offer a prayer service on Zoom at 7:00 p.m. We will pray the same liturgy twice - once before Election Day, and once

after. Join us for these services, for prayer matters - it forms us and changes us. Later in the month, we will worship again on the eve before Thanksgiving at 7:00 p.m. and turn to God in deep thanks for all that God has given us. The last Sunday of the month, as I mentioned, is Advent 1. We will then hold weekly evening worship services on Wednesdays for the season - December 2, 9, 16, and 23.

As the holiday season settles in around us, we will no doubt deeply notice and grieve the differences this year. We will yearn for those traditions and expressions we hold dear that will be changed, adapted, or completely foregone. I will likely be unable to celebrate Christmas with my grandparents this year, as they live in a nursing facility that is locked down. Sharing a meal with them on Christmas is part of how I understand the incarnation of God in Christ. Still, I will look for God's incarnation in whatever presents itself, and know that somehow God's love will greet me with surprise and wonder. To be sure, there is much to grieve over the course of these months, and we carry this grief with us. It is a part of us now. Let us look with these eyes on what is all around us and before us this season. We will see God, for God is with us. We are not alone.

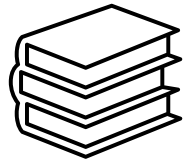

Garden of the Righteous Article and Videos

In early 2018, our church hosted a well-attended presentation of Garden of the Righteous, a program of music by klezmer group *Naye Strunes* and stories about the Righteous among the Nations, people who risked their lives to rescue Jews and others from the Nazis. Since then, the presentation has been given more than 50 times, in churches, libraries, and community centers. Marty Lewis-Hunstiger and Gretta Hunstiger co-authored a scholarly article about the presentations.

In these pandemic times, public presentations aren't possible, so the group has created a one-hour video documentary about Garden of the Righteous. Among other stories, Marty tells of a Dutch family who hid many people at their farm, ferried many others to safety, and even faked a pregnancy so that a baby born in hiding could be passed off as theirs. Gretta tells about Irina Sendler, who smuggled more than 2500 babies out of the Warsaw Ghetto. The video includes information about Doctors without Borders, whom *Naye Strunes* members regard as modern-day Righteous among the Nations.



We then recorded a discussion of the documentary by a panel of scholars, addressing the social and political status of Jewish people in Europe, in the past and today; considering Ashkenazic culture, the source of klezmer, that was almost eradicated; diagnosing Nazism and similar “domination cultures”; and advocating for the idea of allyship, how it helped during the Holocaust and its need today.

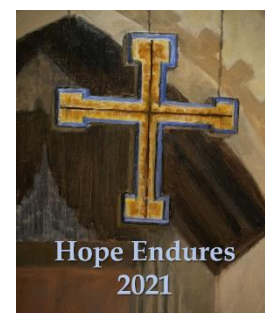

General giving totaled \$33,521 for the month of September. General giving is \$7,062 less than budgeted. Year-to-date general giving totaled \$367,913, \$163 more than budgeted. Rental income totaled \$18,717, over-budget as the August PEASE Academy rent was deposited in September. Overall, rental income is lower due to fewer daily parking tenants and decreased income from use of facilities. Income for the month totaled \$53,423 contributing to a total year-to-date income of \$463,662, \$16,768 under-budget.

Expenses totaled \$49,512 for the month of September. Salaries & Benefits totaled \$37,596, over-budget as the October 2nd payroll was processed in September. Year-to-date, expenses total \$467,158, \$16,818 under-budget. We had a net operating income of \$3,911 for the month and a net operating loss of \$3,536 year-to-date. As of September 30, we have \$340K in current assets – primarily composed of our checking and savings account (including the Payroll Protection Program funds).

In September, we received \$10,889 in Capital Campaign contributions. The current Capital Campaign is winding down – ending in January 2021. In February 2018, we began this campaign with several projects in mind: restoring the stain glass windows, building a community bread oven, creating a children's play area, performing organ repairs and giving a portion to good ministries we choose together. As we enter the final months of the Capital Campaign, we ask you kindly to fulfill your pledge. We look forward to distributing benevolences to several organizations later in the year. The Executive Committee alongside the Vision and Governance Board continue to monitor and evaluate our financial position. We remain diligent and attuned to our situation during this unique time.
