Do This in Remembrance of Me

I write on the heels of a great retreat at Camp Amnicon with beloveds from University Lutheran Church of Hope and First Congregational. The weekend is fresh in my memory: the fun group that came together as Christ's community, the dreamy evening on the beach with a cohort of kids caked with sand together running into the soft waves of Lake Superior, the strum of guitar and multiple generations finding common songs, the fire crackling as the sun set on a good day.



On Sunday morning of that same retreat, while our respective faith communities worshiped back home, we gathered for a simple service. One of my memories is pictured to the left, from just before worship when a gaggle of kids knelt in a small circle, heads down, assisting one of



the bunch to tune her ukulele. She wanted to be ready to lead us in singing *This Little Light of Mine* and that group took worship preparation and instrument tuning with the utmost seriousness. I also have a memory of the murmur of conversation during the reflection time (a.k.a. sermon). Rest and renewal were our theme for the weekend. We'd read scripture and a passage from Tricia Hersey's *Rest Is Resistance*, and then shared reflections about rest, grace, and our life of faith. The audio memory of engaged conversation is strong in my ear. Praise God.

On this cusp between summer and fall, I've been thinking a lot about memories. The palpable memories of summer around church: the sanctuary when sunlight flickers through the stained glass and the sounds of outside waft gently through the open windows; the magic of Courtyard Concerts; the way the Tuesday facilities crew gets things done and at once supports one another; the kids at Beloved Community Day Camp energetic, indeed, passionate, amidst the massive, colorful cardboard city they created with their vision of God's justice and God's love; our Guatemala group standing shoulder to shoulder as we set off at the start of the day.

What are your summer memories? The first glimpse of the lake? A family reunion group picture with everyone squeezed in? A day at the state fair? A bounty of tomatoes?

With fall, there are the start-of-school memories: kids excited and nervous pausing just long enough for a first day picture; college students and parents schlepping bins and boxes; the sounds of international students rolling suitcases along Dinkytown sidewalks; loved ones near and far tethering their brood (yes, even the fully grown ones) with prayers and text loops. These pivotal experiences are etched on our hearts, saved in our ears, held in muscle memory.

"Do this in remembrance of me" we hear in our Holy Communion liturgy each Sunday. Memory grounds our days, Jesus knew that, and intuitively so do we. Shoulder to shoulder we come – humble, brave, hungry. We are fed again by our Savior with a bit of bread, a sip of wine, and the indelible promise that God's love is wide enough to keep our coming and our going, God's grace is big enough to hold our very lives - whatever the future will bring, and God's call is ours close to home, far afield, or everywhere in between. Thanks be to God. Dear ones, blessed memory-making in this new season.

A few years ago I read a book called The Lazy Genius Way by Kendra Adachi. In the book, Kendra describes what it means to be a Lazy Genius - be a genius about the things that matter and lazy about the things that don't. Then, she outlines 13 "Lazy Genius Principles" that you can use to help you become a Lazy Genius. (There's also a podcast, if you're really into this idea.)

One of the Lazy Genius Principles is to "Start Small." As we begin another school year and enter into the season of fall - whether your life revolves around a school calendar or not - it's often a time when routines or schedules shift, which means, it's also a time to set up some new routines. What is one small way you could shift your schedule or routine

to further support your faith life in this change of season? Maybe it's time to set a limit on specific apps on your phone that distract you from other meaningful parts of your life. Maybe there's a new song to integrate into your shower singing that grounds you in God's love. Maybe you set up the coffee machine the night before and take those extra few minutes in the morning to take a deep breath, remembering that God is as close to you as your very breath. Maybe you do one stretch before you crawl in bed for the night, giving thanks for a body that still carries you through your days. Whatever it might be - start small! And remember, that you are God's beloved yesterday, today, and for every day forward.

This past year 26 people from Hope participated in the <u>ACTION Project</u> - a program developed and led by Rev. Jia Starr Brown addressing racism and white supremacy in Minnesota through learning and action. It was a powerful, enriching, and important experience for all who participated.

Update from the Donation Listening Team: Meetings with Pastor Kate Reuer Welton and Nick Tangen

The Donation Listening Team at University Lutheran Church of Hope recently had insightful conversations with Pastor Kate from Lutheran Campus Ministry at the University of Minnesota and Nick Tangen, former ULCH staff member who is now Director of Faith Practices and Neighboring Practices at the Minneapolis Area Synod.

Pastor Kate challenged us to think about imaginative practices that counter the production-driven worldview that college students and all young people face: What would it look like to create opportunities to engage with hope and beauty in a university environment, and how can the church do this differently from the academy? We talked about this for both graduate and undergraduate students as well as underserved young adults in the neighborhood. Another key takeaway from our conversation with Pastor Kate was her counsel that any investment in the transient university context requires heavy investment in staffing and budget for marketing, in order to be sustainable.

Nick Tangen stressed relationship-building as central to any program or initiative we launch, challenging us to move away from just having a service mindset, and instead empowering community members where they are, or even letting them take the lead. Students and young people and all our neighbors crave community, and they are more likely to feel part of a community when they are invited to contribute, rather than just receive. He noted that students expect churches to market to them, but may benefit more from co-creating community on their own terms.

Both conversations highlighted the need to look outward, listen deeply, and build genuine relationships. As we consider utilizing our donation, we should provide opportunities for mutual exchange where students and neighbors can contribute their diverse gifts. Our goal is not just to serve them, but to walk alongside them in community.

Monthly Financials - General giving was slightly low this month at \$41,83719 for 94% of budget. YTD giving is at 105.7% of budgeted revenue. Rental income for July is \$11,804.50 giving us a total income of \$77,901.39. A recent contract with a construction company for the parking lot will help us get caught up on rental income.

Our net income for the month was \$6,928.91. July was a good month, with our expenses only 80% of the budget. So, despite our income for the month being less than expected, with the expenses lower we ended in the black.

As of July 31st, we have \$798,732 in current assets – primarily composed of our checking and savings account of which \$468,049 is in the dedicated accounts. This leaves the church with \$330,683 available as reserves.

Capital Campaign – Opening Doors
