Stardust and Labyrinths – The Lenten Journey

Last month, as we celebrated Epiphany with stations around the sanctuary, one station invited you to consider that you are stardust. According to the website for the American Museum of Natural History in New York City, *"Every atom of oxygen in our lungs, of carbon in our muscles, of calcium in our bones, of iron in our blood - was created inside a star before Earth was born. Hydrogen and helium, the lightest elements were produced in the Big Bang."*

We are stardust, literally made from the same elements as the stars that decorate the skies at night. Therefore, we are also connected to every living thing in all the world - the microbes in the soil that grow our food, the trees in the park that provide us with



shade, the critters that crawl and growl and skitter through the night. It is easy to forget, however, about the whole world of which we are a part. To place the importance of our running and rushing above all else.

I'm thinking about this as we prepare to enter the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday on February 14th – yes on Valentine's Day! I imagine that some in our congregation, like me, look forward to Lent, to a contained season in which we are invited to focus our spiritual life in some way. And others who feel this season is simply depressing, like we're all asked to think about how bad we are and deny ourselves of simple pleasures in life.

The invitation as we enter into this liturgical season in our lives doesn't have to be just penitential in a punitive way. We don't have to go about the journey of Lent in a way that reminds us we're terrible sinners in need of God's redeeming love at the resurrection of Christ. Lent can also be a time in which we right-size ourselves and our priorities and our sense of importance. Where we remember our place in the whole story, in the family of all living things. That we are a part of a much larger creation, that all of creation is precious to God.

Thanks to the help of funding from a trust grant, we have been able to purchase a labyrinth this winter for our congregational use. An ancient tool for prayer, labyrinths have been used by many people and many communities around the world throughout time. Unlike a maze, which often has many different paths you can take - not all of which will get you to the end, a labyrinth always only has one path to be taken. You cannot get lost.

A Labyrinth also happen to be a good tool for right-sizing our perceptions of ourselves. For letting go of what journey we think we're on, so that we might enter the journey on which God calls us. A journey on which you are never lost. You are invited this season to experience the labyrinth. Such an ancient tool, the labyrinth offers new ways to pray, to be grounded, to remember you are connected to all that is.

So, as we approach the beginning of Lent, we are invited to contemplate our place amongst the reality of all things. To remember that just as we are beloved stardust, we are just that - dust! And what a splendid relief. What a freedom. What a joy to right-size ourselves in this time and place. Blessings to you all as you enter the Lenten Journey.

Care and Nurture Corner - Compassion Care

I have been in so many conversations lately about the rampant suffering we see around us - from the global to the very local. Witnessing or experiencing such suffering can be very hard on us. One of the beautiful things about being a part of a faith community is that we are equipped to accompany one another through all the various challenges that life can bring. Even though our own suffering is unique to us, we never have to experience it on our own. Hope member and Compassion Care leader, Ann Agrimson, shares below her thoughts and experience both as a compassion caregiver and as someone who has received compassion care in the past.

Would I want a Compassion Care person to talk to?

Perhaps you think that Compassion Care is only for someone who is going through something really, really hard. Or perhaps you think you'll be asked all types of personal questions that you don't want to answer. Maybe you aren't sure what Hope's Compassion Care ministry is!

The Compassion Care ministry at Hope is made of a group of volunteers who are trained to listen. We're not counselors or therapists or pastors. We're here for anyone who would like an empathetic ear to listen to them.

Even though I'm a member of the Compassion Care team, I have found myself in a position where I needed Compassion Care. There are times when life piles on too much and to have someone who will listen, without criticism, without fixing it, is such a rare gift in this world! It allowed me to step back, take a breath, and get some perspective on my life.

I invite you, if you are asked by Pastor Maria or Pastor Jen "Would you like a Compassion Care person?" don't be quick to say no. This ministry is one of the ways Hope can walk with you in life's journey. You don't need to do it alone. That's what our community is for.


Annual Meeting and Fellowship Meal on February 11th


2024 University Lutheran Church of Hope Congregational Book Read

Leaving the USA (realistic fiction)

It was a sunny October afternoon when Eduardo wrapped up his shift as lead chef. It was time to pick up his kids from school. At 5 and 8, they were especially excited when it was dad's turn to bring them home.

That day, however, they would be left waiting. For as Eduardo left the back door, heaving a bag of kitchen trash into the dumpster, two gentleman stood in his path, holding their ICE* badges for him so see. They asked him to get in their car and explained that there was a question about a charge of drug possession from 2015. Eduardo tried to explain that this charge was long settled. Maybe, was the answer, as the car drove to the Bishop Wipple Federal Building near the MSP airport.

How could Eduardo have guessed that he would spend a month in ICE detention at a county jail, receive a deportation order, and have only brief phone calls with his family in St. Paul. Several hearings with the judge proved to be of no avail, and one Sunday he was told his flight to the Mexican border was leaving in a few days. For the flight, he would only have the unwashed clothes from cooking on the day of his arrest, and his wallet. His family was not able to get him any further supplies, nor was anyone waiting for him at the border.

The Sanctuary & Immigration Team invites you to our forum on February 25th. We will create Dignity Backpacks for people like Eduardo who have next to nothing as they go to a country they may barely know. Thanks to the Trust Board for funding the purchases of backpacks and daily essentials, and to the non-profit Conversation with Friends for getting the packs to the deportees who have requested them.

Feb 25: Dignity Backpacks for ICE Deportees — Every three weeks Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) flies 30-40 people from Minnesota to the Mexican border. They have been in ICE detention for anywhere from a week to a year. They may have little more than the clothes in which they were arrested. Join us as we learn

about the lives of these deportees, and help create backpacks with essential items for those who need them. This forum will be part learning, part action. All supplies provided.

President's Message

"To Western or comfortable people, surrender and letting go sounds like losing, but they are actually about accessing a deeper, broader sense of the self, which is already whole, already content, already filled with abundant life." - Richard Rohr

I have been meditating on these words recently. Placing God in the center rather than ourselves as the mover of existence - what a countercultural notion! In that wonderful paradoxical way of Jesus's teachings, it seems that losing is "winning." We don't have to approach life from a scarcity model of existence. That model so often tells us that we are not enough, or that we do not have enough. God's grace reminds us that we are in fact more than enough - just as we are - as children of God. What a freeing message to remind us of the abundance that we already have and helping us not to worry about not having enough.

The large donation our church has received comes from this place of abundance. I see this abundant Christcentered way of existence lived out in so many ways in the Hope community on a day-to-day basis, people regularly giving their time, energy, creativity, talents, and money.

Our congregation continues to refine how we might leverage the large donation to further the goals of the donor, that include wanting the money to "strengthen the Hope Congregation and/or infrastructure, - to strengthen Hope inwardly so that our community is better able to reach out in love to the wider community later." The donor also indicated they want "Hope to be a 'draw' in the University and Southeast communities." There are four areas of exploration currently ongoing: hospitality spaces, wellness, themed programming, and interior/exterior building projects. These groups have been meeting and will update their progress to the Vision and Governance Board in March to further the goals of the donor.

On February 4 during worship we will bless the pledges for the "Opening Doors 2" capital appeal. This appeal can allow us to be open and approach life from a place of abundance. We are grateful for the leadership of the appeal committee consisting of Tim Abrahamson, Deb Bordsen, Sharlene Hensrud, Ben Hartmann, Gretchen Peik, and Erik Strand. The completion of our mortgage at the end of this appeal will enable us to consider what new opportunities our congregation might pursue. Responding to God's Grace from a place of abundance allows us to let go and surrender to the spirit moving in this place.

Due to the generosity of our congregation, the board has been able to craft a budget that will be proposed to the congregation at our annual meeting on February 11th. In addition to thanking the congregation, I would also like to give thanks for the hard work of the Gratitude and Generosity Committee comprised of Ben Hartmann, Deb Strand, and Don Hauge.

In February, our congregation welcomes a new president, Linda Herman. Other folks on the board will be departing and new faces will fill their roles. We have a wealth of thoughtful, faithful, and dedicated members in our midst who embody the ethos of letting go and falling into the abundance that is already present in our lives. It is truly humbling and inspiring to be part of this congregation that in so many ways eschews a culture of scarcity and says YES to God in response to the YES of God for the world. Grounded in our surrender to God's grace, may we, in the words that the appeal committee so wonderfully crafted, continue to "offer an extravagant welcome and a generous sending out into the world to advocate and serve."
