Through the month of February, our Sanctuary and Immigration Team has invited us to help prepare backpacks. Dignity Backpacks they've called them. These are backpacks stocked with supplies and given (via a group called Conversations with Friends) to beloved ones who are about to be flown from MSP back to the southern border, and deported. Life as they've known it - sometimes for decades, family and friends, work and responsibilities - shifts in an instant.



Many of you have been involved in this project: a Trust grant funded the backpacks, the team worked hard to invite and organize us, many donated specific supplies, those at the Sunday Forum and Sunday School in late February learned a little about our complicated immigration situation and then prepared the backpacks, during worship we wrote notes of encouragement to accompany each pack, and finally the backpacks were blessed and we prayed for those who would receive them, their families, and the system.

This Central American hymn has been in my ear (and therefore on my tongue) these last weeks. In English we sing, "The angels are not sent into our world of

pain to do what we were meant to do in Jesus' name...that falls to you and me, and all who are made free. Help us, O Lord, we pray, to do your will today." By grace we are made free, my friends. With that grace we live, we learn, we respond. With the dignity backpacks, I've valued the small glimpse into the hard choices and situations faced by many, including some who we love and hold close. This helps me get in touch with my assumptions, my privilege, my power, and the ways I can stretch my compassion and be part of advocating for change. So often we want to do it all, or do it all right, and it's humbling to take these small and meaningful steps, open to the learning as we go, for that, too, is part of the change.

Have you checked out Javier Zamora's book <u>Solito</u>? <u>Solito</u> is Zamora's memoir of migrating from El Salvador to the United States alone (solito) as a 9 year old in 1999. I read Solito this past summer and was engrossed. It's an important story told through the eyes of a child. The Racial Justice Team, Sanctuary and Immigration Team and the Book Club invite us into conversation about <u>Solito</u> during May, so you've got a little time to find the book and do some reading!

This has been an intense month with plenty of emotion: playful events like Mardi Gras Mini Golf; the joy of hosting another stunning Night Songs; scary health situations, grief, and a lot of support and prayer; some beautiful shared leadership as our congregational leaders stepped up for one another and the community; Ash Wednesday and the start of our Lenten journey; discernment and living with the unknowns. I am strongly aware of Christ's presence leading us in this season. Thank you for your prayers and I hold you in my prayers. God bless you in these days.

March 30: Easter Vigil service at 7 p.m., an ancient service in which telling the story of the arc of redemption throughout the bible is shared with creative, storytelling-style readings and music.


Congregational Retreat and Camp at Amnicon August 16-18, 2024

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What Happened at the Annual Meeting?

The Annual Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, February 11, 2024. Here are a few highlights of the meeting:

- Prayed and sang together.
- Heard from leaders who are part of the four areas of exploration (hospitality spaces, wellness, themed programing, interior/exterior building projects) with highlights.
- Celebrated our partnership with Lutheran Campus Ministry-Twin Cities by giving them a check for \$42,517 as a seed for their endowment campaign. This money is part of the donation and an exciting first step in using this generous gift.
- Received the financial report from 2023 (we did well) with a note about benevolence giving.
- Passed the 2024 budget totaling \$721,815. This includes a 3.2% bump for staff salaries.
- Thanked outgoing Vision and Governance Board members and others. Board members who concluded terms were: Ann Agrimson (completing a cycle as VP/President/Past President), Betty Schreuder (Treasurer), Matt Fry (Worship and Music), Jacob Lanthier (Youth and Young Adults).
- Elected new leaders for many groups, including those coming onto the Vision and Governance Board: John
 Pignatello (Vice President), Micki Kruse (Worship and Music), Zach Rau (Youth and Young Adults). Linda Herman has
 become our Congregational President and Paul Odenbach has moved into the Past President role. The Vision and
 Governance Board will approve a new Treasurer because we weren't yet ready at the Annual Meeting. [LATE
 BREAKING NEWS: Thanks to Ruth Hedman for stepping into the role of Congregational Treasurer. It's now official!

Baking Hope Update

Can you already smell the bread baking? Our Baking Hope Team will be firing up the ovens again to provide bread on March 3 and April 7th! The bread ministry baking schedule is making a switch to the first weekend of the month for March, April and going forward. Congregational members have done a phenomenal job of reserving bread ahead of time. Thank you! This greatly helps us in planning bread bake quantities. As usual, these bread bakes provide artisan bread for the following ministries:



- Friendly Visitors, who bring God's love to those who cannot make it to worship
- Compassion Care, a confidential ministry provided by trained lay members who offer care and support to those in the midst of grief and life crisis
- Portland House, a Lutheran Social Service program which provides an alternative to incarceration and prison prevention.

Additionally, bread bake monetary donations provide funding for the summer pizza bakes, so that these may be offered free of charge. **Notice anything new by our wood-fired oven?** A group of volunteers along with the professional skills of Terrapin Landscaping, helped complete the stone bench in front of the oven. Thanks to Bryan Kufus, Paul Demueles, and Tom Peluf for the beautiful stonework on this project!

In May, we switch to congregational pizza bakes! Pizza will be provided for the congregation after church on the last day of Sunday School, May 19th, on June 23rd and on September 15th. At these events, we will provide fresh Neapolitan style pizzas made with our new pizza press. Thank you, Trust Board for making this purchase possible!

Monthly Financials: As mentioned at the annual meeting, some income expected in 2023 was received in 2024. That combined with the normal monthly giving starts us out strong for the year. In January we received \$75,392. Rental income also started out strong at \$12,468. With interest from the money market of our reserves at \$920, our total income was \$88,780.

Our net income for the month was \$31,238 thanks to the strong giving. The overall monthly expenses were under what was budgeted but we did have a repair bill for the heating system from December that was \$1920. We also paid our worker's comp. insurance for the full year at a cost of \$3791. Our gas bill was only 55% of the budgeted amount, which I am sure is due to the warmer weather we have been experiencing.

As of January 31st, we have \$860,565 in current assets – primarily composed of our checking, savings, and E*TRADE accounts of which \$492,151 is in the dedicated accounts. This leaves the church with \$368,414 available as reserves.

Capital Campaign – Opening Doors: The Opening Doors 1 Capital Campaign giving in January was \$7,236. We have a total in reserves of \$205,007. Thank you for giving to Opening Doors 1. Thanks to those who have pledged to Opening Doors 2. Look for emails about benevolence giving for Opening Doors 1. President's Report: Glimmer

I've been listening. As a member of the Donation Discernment Listening team, I listened to your hopes and dreams for this congregation. For several years, as a member of the Gratitude and Generosity team, I watched those who generously give their time and talents to serve this congregation and our neighbors. Thanks to Pastor Ingrid Rasmussen's (Holy Trinity Lutheran) Epiphany sermon, I learned that there is a word for these ear and eye witnessings, they are "glimmers" – moments of joy that reflect an awareness of God's grace - "Grace upon grace." (John 1:16).

In a season during which we have been mindful of the financial support necessary to make Hope's ministries possible, there has been a wealth of glimmers. Testimonials of long-time Hope members during Gratitude and Generosity moments in worship, statements of appreciation for Hope we heard during the Open Doors 2 capital campaign launch meetings, and the cherished memories of those who found their way here because of Lutheran Campus Ministry, remind us that Hope has been, and continues to be, a wellspring of faith. "Surrounded by such... witnesses... let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us." (Hebrews 12:1)

By the grace of God and the generosity of faithful and talented volunteers, Hope is thriving. In Night Songs, we were star gazers, launched into space with celestial music. Every Sunday morning, worship leaders make music, read, pray, serve at the endless table, and staff the holy experiment with their technical expertise. Some stoke fires and bake bread. Men and women join in the ministry of the meatball, again preparing the fellowship meals that we had longed to return to. One hundred-year-old doors are refinished, the boiler is tended, and the grounds are cultivated by folks who cherish our church home. And some serve on committees, maintaining a watchful eye and dreaming of what yet might be.

Our Pastors, Jen, and Maria, inspire, challenge, and pray with us, sharing our grief and joy. With their leadership, by God's grace, and with great joy, Hope "offers an extravagant welcome and a generous sending out into the world to advocate and serve" (the Open Doors 2 appeal).

Announced at the annual meeting, a glimmer was made possible by the generous donation Hope received, when, after months of listening and discernment, attending to the dreams of members who eagerly accepted the challenge of "going above and beyond," Lutheran Campus Ministry, our ministry partners supporting University students, was chosen to receive \$42,674.80. There was no more frequent message that we, Donation Discernment Listeners. heard than "for the students." Now, the work of the four Exploration groups — hospitality spaces, wellness, themed programming, and inside/outside building projects — continues, making the discernment journey, itself, a part of the gift. The Vision and Governance Board receives updates from the groups (as you heard in the annual meeting in February), promotes communication and collaboration between the groups, and looks out for our commitment to restorative justice. We walk out in faith.

Walking together on our Lenten journey, I have read that, in the labyrinth, we walk and pray, without fear of getting lost. (grace.org/labyrinth) And isn't that what we do together at Hope?
