The Village

Some 25 years ago I volunteered for a stint with the Lutheran church in Zimbabwe, in southern Africa. In both Zimbabwe and in their neighbor to the north, Zambia, I was to visit congregations and church schools, and to encourage youth, young adults and women. I have photos that I pull out occasionally, more often I rely on my mind's eye.

Today I'm recalling a snapshot I took one warm, sunny afternoon. We had been talking and singing with a group of younger teens in a shady area under some trees. As we returned to the center of the village, I snapped a photo of the scene: the well-trod path we followed,



the round huts with their thatched roofs, the kids teasing playfully as we walked, some carrying stout hand-carved stools on their heads or at their waists.

When it came time this March to dedicate our Easter Flowers (thank you, Friendly Visitors, for this opportunity), I dedicated our family's to "Our Village". I was thinking about our parents (aka Grammy and Grampy, and Grandma and Grandpa). And I was also thinking of close friends we've known for decades, other friends who grace our lives for a season or two, lively congregations and colleagues, our neighbors, educators and support staff at multiple schools, therapists, coaches, faithful pets, and more. These beloved ones, you beloved ones, are Our Village. Some years we have very specific people to remember or honor with these flowers. This year, it's Our Village that we lift up, the whole eco-system of support.

I've been musing about Jesus' village. Elizabeth with arms wide in welcome as Mary begins to comprehend this new thing. The animals and humans who welcome Jesus and his family that starry night of his birth. Anna and Simeon with their blessings. The angels and co-conspirators who shelter Jesus' family in Egypt. The elders in the synagogue with whom young Jesus engages, much to his worried parent's dismay. The disciples, the Twelve, of course, but really the whole community of disciples who call Jesus friend, teacher and savior, who share the meal and wash the feet. Those who pushed against the powers in that fraught season when Jesus was put to death. The ones who cry at the cross, care for his mother, lend their tomb, bring the spices, and wrap his lifeless body. The women who catch their breath in surprise finding the tomb empty, and the ones who run like the wind to see for themselves and then to share this breathtaking news. Those who walk the road and in the evening recognize Jesus in breaking of the bread, and those for whom Jesus offers breakfast on the beach. All of them and so many more, Jesus' Village.



Around the Hope community, I am consistently moved as I witness The Village—those who pray, those who bring a meal, those who labor behind the scenes, the hugs, the care and concern during a times of illness, crisis, or loss, the expressions of gratitude and willingness to act from grace, the voices and bodies for justice, the desire to learn and change. At our best, we show up for one another. At our best, we seek to show up for our neighbors. Truth is, being The Village, is inherently risky, for sometimes we fail, by what we've done and what we haven't done. And yet it's a risk I find worthwhile, and a calling of faithful community, indeed, a way we follow Jesus. We are The Village. With Wild Church we're widening even how we understand The Village. We're in relationship with all creation, humankind, the other creatures, the land.

In this season of death and life, new life, I give thanks for The Village. The gift of The Village. The invitation to widen our understanding of The Village. And the promise that Jesus Christ, our Risen Savior, meets us—always—on the Village path with mercy and love, with liberation, with new life and another opportunity to start anew. Thanks be to God.

University Lutheran Church of Hope's Racial Justice Team 2022-2032 Long-Term Goals

In 2022, the University Lutheran Church of Hope Racial Justice Team held a retreat to review and revise its long-term goals. In November, 2022 the Team presented our new goals to the Vision and Governance Board for consideration. Here are the Racial Justice Team's current goals for 2022 to 2032:

"We, as a congregation, actively seek to stand together with people of all races, ethnicities, cultures and religions to promote the joy of fellowship and the dignity of equal opportunity."

- Racial Justice Statement, 2018

"Antiracism is not a destination but a journey—one that takes deliberate, consistent work."

- Ibram X. Kendi, Be Antiracist: A Journal for Awareness, Reflection, and Action

Connect our work to our faith: Our goal as followers of the Way of Jesus is to actively participate in God's transformative work: serving as sources of Justice, Kindness, and Cultural Humbleness. (Micah 6:8)

Congregational commitment to address reparations: Articulate a proposal for the congregation (and secure its adoption), committing us to take action with regard to reparations, including a statement of purpose, annual financial support, and time spent supporting followership of key BIPOC partner organizations.

Develop awareness in our team and congregation: The Racial Justice Team aims to develop ourselves and the congregation's racial awareness and to acknowledge and address white privilege and systemic racism with cultural humility.

Documentation/communication/regular reminders of long-term goals/vision: Communicating and documenting vision, goals, and plans with the congregation, allies, and neighbors is an essential part of working toward racial awareness, sensitivity, and humility.

Stronger relationships and followership with BIPOC organizations in their work: We will build stronger relationships and followership with BIPOC organizations to work toward a vision of God's Kingdom and beloved community by identifying BIPOC businesses, groups and congregations in the metro area who are engaged in justice work, listening, and accompanying them in their mission.

Accountability: Readiness to learn, receive feedback and make changes in approach and direction.

These goals are meant to support racial justice and be inspiring, empowering, active, fluid, and sustainable. The Racial Justice Team is currently considering amending or revising its goals to move beyond a Land Acknowledgement into reparations. We welcome input from the congregation on any of our racial justice goals.



Growing Traditions: Why Do We Ring the Bell during the Lord's Prayer?

At Hope, we have a tradition of ringing the church bell during the Lord's Prayer. Unless it's freezing cold out, we open the front door so those in the sanctuary can hear it. We've even done it worshipping outside in the summer.

All traditions start somewhere; this one started in the 1980s with a Hope member, William Marvin, who often was an usher. He and his family were from Germany, where ringing the bell as a way of sending the congregation's prayers out into the community was a frequent custom. He suggested we do it too, and something about this simple action resonated with us enough that we've done it ever since. The Marvins live in Colorado now, though they stay connected to Hope friends. But the tradition of ringing the bell has stayed, maintained by the ushers.

There are other traditions that resonate with people but need human energy to maintain them. During the Prayers of the People, the Assisting Minister invites us to speak aloud or silently the names of people in our hearts. This tradition was suggested by Pauline Hendrickson, who had experienced it in the church she attended when they lived in Belgium. She described the sound as a murmur of names throughout the congregation, with people knowing that someone sitting near them had

people in mind. Another tradition: At communion we invite people to come forward for a blessing. This was actually suggested by me, after I experienced it attending church at Westminster Abbey in London – an intimate moment in this huge, ancient church.

These newer traditions resonate with people. They have structures to support them, like the ushers support ringing the bell. Assisting Ministers invite us to say names aloud, and the Presiding Minister invites us to come for a blessing (it's printed in the bulletin too). What can we, in the congregation, do to encourage these welcomes, so that they can become as much a regular part of our worship as ringing the bell during the Lord's Prayer? We say names silently, if that's our piety, but speaking names out loud could encourage others around us who want to but aren't sure they can. For coming forward for a blessing, if we have brought guests to church who aren't going to take communion, or if there are people sitting near us who look like they aren't going to take communion (hopefully we've already greeted them passing the peace), we can invite them to come forward with us to be blessed.

Monthly Financials — While our General Giving for February was down, Parking Income made up for the difference with a contract with one of the construction companies for multiple parking spots for multiple months. Our parking lot is another gift that keeps on giving. YTD our Total Income is above budget by \$33K. Thank you for the strong start to 2024. Our expenses are tracking to budget for the year. YTD our net income is above budget by \$32K. Thank you!

President's Report: Walking the Walk

Have you been walking the labyrinth? During our Lenten journey, I've walked the labyrinth a few different times, using the prayer practices around which our Wednesday Lenten services were planned. With Lectio Divina, I meditated on the affirmations of God's steadfast love, written on the chapel walls. As a breath prayer, I repeated my mantra, given to me by a friend, [inhale] Who are we to place limits, [exhale] on what God can do? I chanted words from the Sighs Too Deep Liturgy we have been singing during Lenten Sunday worship, "Grace upon grace, mercy upon mercy, peace upon peace, given for you." And sang, "Light of the world of endless blessing, we lift our hearts in thanks and praise." Walking the labyrinth with prayer practices has brought me to the *center* "... deeply rooted in God's love, reminded of who and whose we are, and re-oriented towards the promise that we cannot get lost." (Pastor Maria's sermon, first Sunday in Lent)

The prayer practice of walking the labyrinth has become a way I think about the discernment journey we have been traveling together since receiving the generous gift to the congregation. Connecting prayerful walking of the labyrinth with the discernment journey underscores that we are *not* just talking about money. Guided by the Holy Spirit, we are **walking the walk**. Neither the labyrinth nor the discernment journey is a linear path, but in both, we *are* praying and walking together, so we don't get lost. The journey began with the Donation Discernment group who, following Hope's work in the Riverside Innovation Hub, counseled,

- "As we listen to each other, we should keep the lines of communication open during this journey, valuing openness, transparency....
- As we listen to the Holy Spirit and consider our mission/vision, we should build on our existing strengths, do things that
 tie into our existing time and talents, and strengthen our community inwardly so that we can have a broader impact on
 a wider community.
- The journey should proceed in a way that is equitable and inclusive of all."

(Summary of Notes from Discernment Meetings)

In many diverse formats, we spoke with each other about our dreams, picturing what, together, we might accomplish with the gift. Here is a link to the compilation of what we Listeners heard: <u>Donation-Listening-Compilation-Epistle-Oct-5.pdf</u> (ulch.org).

Repeatedly, we Listeners heard "for the students", folks frequently naming Hope's partnership with Lutheran Campus Ministry. The Vision and Governance Board unanimously voted to support LCM with the first gift from the donation. A check for \$42,517 was presented to LCM Pastor Kate Reuer Welton at the Annual Congregational Meeting, met with heart-felt applause. Afterward, folks greeted Pastor Kate, reminiscing about their own LCM days that brought them to Hope, wanting students now to receive that same blessing – passing it on.

Based on the Listeners' reporting, the V and G Board identified members' most frequently expressed, deeply felt, dreams for expanding Hope's current ministries and developing new ones, connecting them with specific projects members proposed. In an October sermon during which Pastor Jen reflected on the challenge of collective discernment, she began, as we do when walking the labyrinth, by calling us to *breathe*,

"Breathe in the love of God
And breathe out your worries
Breathe in the love of God
And breathe out what pulls us apart" (amended)

Seeking consensus in the congregation on the projects that will be funded by the donation, Pastor Jen counseled, "Consensus isn't uniformity, but shaping our hearts together, acting and interacting." The V and G Board established four groups for focused listening (research and field trips!) and interaction: (1) hospitality spaces, (2) wellness, (3) themed programming, and (4) inside/outside building projects. These groups are now meeting and reporting their work to the V and G Board by addressing these questions:

- What has your group been most interested in discussing/doing?
- What ministry areas are you addressing and how are you addressing social justice issues?
- How might it be helpful for your group to coordinate with other groups?

These groups are interdependent, groups 1 and 4 designing and creating the spaces in which the programming planned by groups 2 and 3 might take place. It is not the case that the donation will be equally divided amongst the four groups, nor is it the case that even the very generous gift can fully fund *all* the proposed projects – in the future, some projects may be funded by capital campaigns or dedicated gifts. Spirit-filled ideas will not be forgotten! As Pastor Jen preached, "Trust the process, trust the Holy Spirit." And please pray, hearts together, **walking the walk.**
