A Donation Update ... In the Middle of it All

When our congregation received a generous donation of \$416,000 nearly two years ago, who would have known the journey on which we would embark? Yes, the donation in itself is a gift, but the process of discernment–listening, praying, dreaming, exploring, planning–it turns out this is as much a gift as the donation. Today, in the middle of this journey, I offer this update. Some are deep in the exploration, others might be wondering when we'll ever "get there." Here's the scoop from the middle of it all.

First, looking back: Early on, a discernment team helped us think about "how" we'd make this decision (and, really, it's decisions, plural, for it's a bunch of decisions, not just one). How would many voices be heard? Then a donation team invited your input... and, boy, did we receive it! Thank you. In a variety of venues, the team gathered and then began to organize 70-some pages of ideas and proposals (we call this the "raw data," let me know if you'd like to take a read). Late this fall (2023) during a retreat, the Vision and Governance Board (VGB) looked more closely at the input. We found that the input and our sense of direction led to an initial sharing of \$42,000 with our partners in Lutheran Campus Ministry-Twin Cities (to seed their brand new endowment) and then four areas for exploration.

In the middle. Over the winter four exploration teams have taken big next steps: consulting, researching, going on field trips, asking more questions, getting bids, engaging with the Vision and Governance Board. These four teams are nearing the end of the exploration stage. On May 19, the teams will come together to share with one another their ideas, for it is clear that the exploration is best done in collaboration, not in silos, not in competition. By around June 1, we ask that the teams make specific requests for funding and move into an implementation phase, at least with some of the projects.

Below are ideas that are in the mix, but, as I've said, we're in "the middle," so more prioritizing is yet to come with the guidance of VGB. You'll notice that some intentional synergy is emerging between the groups below.

Through all of this, we're asking each of the groups to consider how Hope's ministry will be enhanced, improved or changed by this proposal, and also who will benefit (the congregation, the neighborhood, students, etc.). These kinds of questions will inform our decision making, for we won't be able to do everything.

What's next? This month will be key as the projects take shape and the Board hones our direction. We're on the cusp! It's a holy experiment to take the next steps and to try something, and that feels like precisely where the Holy Spirit is leading us. Looking back, many of these ideas aren't entirely new, they've been talked about over the years, they represent a commitment to porous walls and to being with our neighbors. And now, with this bold gift and a lot of care and energy, we can witness them coming to fruition. That's exciting!

What can you do? Pray for the process. If these potential projects intrigue you, talk with Congregational President Linda Herman, with the contacts above, or with me. Thanks for your support. God bless the "middle of it all!"





2024 ULCH Congregational Book Read: *Solito: A Memoir*, by Javier Zamora, Sunday, May 12^h, at 9:30 a.m. During the Adult Forum at ULCH.

"Trip. My parents started using that word about a year ago- 'one day, you'll take a trip to be with us. Like an adventure."

Javier Zamora tells the inspiring story of his migration from El Salvador to the United States at the age of nine in this "gripping memoir" (NPR) of bravery, hope, and finding family.



"Javier Zamora was born in El Salvador in 1990. His father fled the country when he was one, and his mother when he was about to turn five. Both parents' migrations were caused by the U.S.funded Salvadoran Civil War. When he was nine Javier migrated through Guatemala, Mexico, and the Sonoran Desert" to connect with his parents in the U.S. <u>www.goodread.com</u>

The Hennepin County Library and Star Tribune used this book in 2023 "as a catalyst for conversation as we attempt to better understand past and current injustices – including systemic racism, other forms of discrimination, and bias that affects marginalized communities."

The ULCH Racial Justice Team, Immigration and Sanctuary Team, and Book Club will host a Congregational Book Read discussion of *Solito: A Memoir*, by Javier Zamora during the Adult Forum on May 12th.

Paddling and Camping

• We also will offer the usual easy trip (about 2 hours) for those interested in arriving Friday night or early Saturday morning. It will start Saturday morning at 9:00 at Interstate Park and end at the Osceola bridge.

• There will be informal campsite meals. They will be Thursday supper through Saturday breakfast.

Led by Lisa Morse and Pastor Maria, our "Bread Board" spent a day in January talking through our purpose, ideals, dreams, and goals. Our passionate group recently finalized the ministry's vision and mission statements. Our vision serves as a broadly defined aspiration, while our mission provides an operational framework for purposeful decision-making:

Vision - A connected community, nourished in mind, body and spirit.

Mission - Baking Hope: We transform grain, water, yeast, and each other through craft, fire, and fun using a wood-fired oven in a spirit of generosity.

Treasurer's Report March 2024 and Year-to-date Income and Expense

As mentioned in past Visitor reports, a donation that had been expected in 2023 was received in 2024 thus our General Giving is better than budget. Because of continuing construction around Dinkytown and PEASE, our Rental Income is out pacing the budget.

Operations had some repairs to the boiler and carpet tiles replaced for a total of \$6.2K. These expenses were able to be absorbed because of a warmer winter and thus lower heating bills. We spent \$4K less in heating costs than budgeted for Q1 2024. Worship Ministries was over budget in Q1 2024 by \$3.3K. Piano and organ maintenance was over budget by \$1.5K.

Our Building Fund has a value as of 3.31.2024 of \$217K. Our new front doors will be installed soon. The bill for these doors will be paid from this fund. This fund is also used to help pay our mortgage. Each month \$6.9K is transferred to our general fund to help pay for the mortgage.

ULCH's financial position continues to be strong. Thank you for your continued support . If you have any questions please reach out.

President's Report We Show Up, *for* Each Other and *with* Our Neighbors

During Lent and Eastertide, our profoundly meaningful worship services were led by our creative and inspiring pastors, Jen, and Maria, and all the faithful others, who **Show Up** - musicians, greeters and ushers, acolytes, lectors, and those who pray, storytellers, those who set the table for communion and serve it, and the technicians who facilitate bringing worship services to those who cannot be present. I am grateful.

"The transformative nature of **Showing Up**," is the theme of Rabbi Sharon Brous' *The Amen Effect: Ancient Wisdom to Mend Our Broken Hearts and the World*. As I read it, in my mind's eye I saw you – the people of Hope – living into the Amen Effect, which Rabbi Brous calls "the sacred mandate." "We celebrate and dance together, we mourn and weep together, because **showing up** – for the grief and the celebration – is a holy practice."

And the people of Hope do **show up** in countless ways, providing hospitality by contributing to a potluck, preparing a fellowship meal, baking bread with donations going to charity, making a Meal Train dinner for friends, serving receptions following memorial services, or volunteering with Every Meal to pack bags for children in need. Friendly Visitors strengthen the ties that bind, so that members know that they are not alone or forgotten. Dignity Backpacks are filled for our immigrant neighbors who are deported, too often with only the clothes they are wearing, and Hope members extend a hand of friendship to those who are detained. And there is much more, as the people of Hope live into Paul's teaching to the congregation in Corinth, "Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love." (1 Corinthians 16: 13-14).

Donation Discernment Exploration Groups dreaming about expanding access to meeting spaces in our building, making hospitality spaces more functional and aesthetically welcoming, and promoting the broadest vision of wellness (see the ELCA Wholeness Wheel: <u>WW Competencies.pdf (elca.org)</u>) for our members and neighbors, will expand our capacity to **show up** to address the scourge of loneliness. As our friend, Nick Tangen, posted in "Facing an Epidemic of Loneliness in the Neighborhood" May 8, 2023, "Once we acknowledge that community well-being emerges from the depth of our relationships, we as the church can go out into the community armed with the practices like table fellowship, deep listening and discernment, intercessory prayer, and mutual hospitality."

Lutheran Campus Ministry, our partners in ministry with University of Minnesota students, hosts the Be Fed program, whose mission is to provide "a place for hungry bodies and spirits." Each week they serve soup and bagels to 50-75 students, one of whom said, "College is an emotionally and physically exhausting experience at times. Coming to Be Fed makes me feel cared for." (Lutheran Campus Ministry newsletter, spring, 2023). On Lutheran Campus Ministry Sunday, we heard student preacher, Shelby Erickson, declare in her sermon, "Blessed Are the Doubters: Finding Faith in Questioning," that her experience with LCM has been life-giving. The Wellness Exploration Group envisions the development of "a sober space where people who live, work, and worship in our neighborhood can experience community, safety, healing, and support for their whole well-being." (ULCH Wellness Center Proposal) This isn't *just* about money, and this isn't *just* about the building. This is about Hope **showing up for ministry.**


