Complex Call Process, Thoughts for the Interim

According to one of our local weather reporters, "Winter is experiencing a 'Minnesota Goodbye' this year."

The liminal relationship between Winter and Spring in Minnesota is a great metaphor for interim ministry, especially now that the Call Committee is active. Interim ministry is a season of lingering in doorways, not yet passing into the next space, not going back to where we used to be.

With the Call Committee, the congregation now eases into a more intense time of discernment. When I took my first interim position, the concept of discernment felt vague and individualized to me. Walking with several



congregations has helped deepen my understanding and experience with discernment. Someone shared a pamphlet with me that offered this concise description of discernment as, "a time of prayerful paying attention in order to be more cooperative with God's activity."

That still takes some unpacking, doesn't it? I have found a "theme verse" for discernment in the book of Jeremiah helpful: Thus says the Lord: Stand at the crossroads, and look, and ask for the ancient paths, where the good way lies; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls. Jeremiah 6:16

In Bible studies and preaching, I often use this verse as a three-part guide to understanding discernment; Discernment is communal, considered, and connected.

Discernment is communal/cooperative: It's not something we should or really can do on our own. *The Lord* who speaks is both one/three; and in listening to these ancient words, we are connected to people and practices that stretch across countless generations.

Discernment is considered: To *stand at the crossroads and look* is an invitation to do things thoughtfully, using all the tools available to us collectively.

And finally, discernment is connected: in asking for and following the ancient paths we connect with the stories and wisdom found in the Bible, confident that the ancient words are still speaking to us today.

Collectively, we trust that God cares more about the outcome than we even do. I suspect that's why Jeremiah describes finding rest for our souls. Typically, when there are big things to be sorted (like calling a new lead pastor), we expect it will take a lot of hard work. And the harder we do the work, the better we expect the result to be. The hard work of discernment, however, is always shared with God. We're offered rest for our souls, trusting God cares more about this congregation and the outcomes of the next few months than even our most anxious hearts.

However long the Minnesota goodbye is, we know that Winter will give way to Spring, just as surely as we know this interim time will lead to a new season of leadership and growth for Hope. Thank you for walking this anxious time together, and keeping the call process in your prayers.


Children's Ministry

Bread for the World Offering of Letters

On Sunday, March 16 the Hope Congregation held their annual Bread for the World Offering of Letters. Sixty-eight letters were written to our lawmakers in D.C. urging them to strengthen and fund international and national hungers programs, like SNAP (once known as food stamps). And to reinstate USAID from which most global food programs come. Twenty-three letters were written to Senator Tina Smith, twenty-two to Senator Amy Klobuchar, fifteen to Representative Ilhan Omar, seven to Representative Betty McCollum and one to Representative Angie Craig.

If you missed an opportunity to write a letter, you are welcome to call the church office for a sample letter. Thank you for your advocacy. It makes a big difference when those who represent us hear from us.

Story of the Land Where Our Church Building Stands

The Racial Justice team is moving forward with our Land Acknowledgement Initiative. In February's open discussions with members of the congregation, we brainstormed possible next steps for action. One small step is to learn the story of how our land (where the church building stands) passed from the hands of the Dakota people to the US government and from there into the hands of private land developers. To accomplish this, we have contracted with Jessica Intermill to research our plot of land. This research was funded by a 2025 Hope Trust grant.

Jessica Intermill is an attorney and a land history consultant. On her company's website she writes, "As an attorney, I've fought for tribal nations' treaty rights in court and advised them in governance work for more than a decade." Her clients "are individuals and organizations who want to look under their homes, schools, businesses, and congregations to understand the circumstances that formed the history of the land they stand on ... Learning your land history is an opportunity to learn about yourself."

Jessica will present her research at the Adult Forum on April 27. She will also tell us about actions we can take, including the Mni Sota Makoce Honor Tax which she created in collaboration with the Lower Sioux Indian Community.


Young Adult Ministry – Gather Twin Cities





Prayers for Turtle Island

Displayed in Hope's kitchenette, and visible from the lounge, is this bold piece called *Prayers for Turtle Island* by Jackie Traverse, an Ojibwe artist born in Winnipeg, Manitoba and from the Lake Saint Martin First Nation. Her paintings, drawings, documentaries and sculptures are inspired by the Anishinaabe culture and her experience of being an Indigenous woman. In this buoyant image, Traverse illuminates her people's prayers for the wellbeing of the earth, symbolized by Turtle Island.

Suspended in watery blue, a totem-like sea turtle's circular shell is overlaid with a metaphorical garden where life is vibrant and abundant, intricate and interrelated, flourishing and harmonious. The turtle's right fin bears an eagle's tail feather, symboling the messenger who travels between the earthly world and the spirit world to carry the prayers of humans to the Great Spirit—Kitchi-Manitou—and the dwelling of the ancestors. In its left fin, a burning smudge stick braided with cedar, sage, sweet grass and tobacco envelopes Turtle Island in all directions with ethereal bellows of pure white smoke, symbolizing sacred ceremonial cleansing to generate healing and summon protection for the earth and all of its plant and animal inhabitants.

"THE STORY OF TURTLE ISLAND varies among Indigenous communities, but by most accounts, it acts as a creation story that places emphasis on the turtle as a symbol of life and earth...



"In some Ojibwe oral traditions, the story of Turtle Island begins with a flooded Earth. The Creator had cleansed the world of feuding peoples in order to begin life anew. Some animals survived the flood, such as the loon, the muskrat and the turtle. Nanabush (Nanabozo) (or Weesakayjack in some Cree tales)—a supernatural being who has the power to create life in others—was also present. Nanabush asked the animals to swim deep beneath the water and collect soil that would be used to recreate the world. One by one the animals tried, but one by one they failed. The last animal that tried — the muskrat — was underwater for a long time, and when it resurfaced, the little animal had wet soil in its paws. The journey took the muskrat's life, but the creature did not die in vain. Nanabush took the soil and put it on a willing turtle's back. This became known as Turtle Island, the centre of creation."
