Thoughts From Pastor Amanda Simons

Happy New Year! And happy Epiphany to you!

As we begin this new year of 2026, I am delighted that I have the honor and joy of serving as your lead pastor, accompanying our congregation in our shared ministry to love God and love our neighbors as ourselves. While I was personally very disappointed to miss worshipping in person with Hope on Christmas Eve due to influenza, I smile every time I remember that there's next Christmas Eve, and I delighted in worshiping online with our congregation and listening to the stories of God's incarnation that shape us for this coming year together.

As we move into this new year and season of Epiphany, a season in which we intentionally look for the beauty of God's presence in our world, marvel at God's manifestation, and ponder anew what God is revealing to us, I wonder: What are the hopes, dreams, and resolutions that you carry forward into 2026? As you see the manifestation, the presence of God, in your life and that of others, what is God revealing to you this season?

On Epiphany Sunday, I included these words from theologian Frank Thomas in my sermon: "Once you see the divine revelation, then you do not need the star, because the external power of the star goes internal."

Remember that God is at work in the world. Lastly, to remember that I am part of a community, a community that believes in justice, peace, and hope, and that together the community makes a tremendous difference in God's world towards God's dreams.

What are yours? And – what are ours together as University Lutheran Church of Hope?

Let's be stargazers and journeyers together this Epiphany season.

Lastly, I ask you to read and ponder one of my favorite poems "For Those Who Have Far To Travel" by Jan Richardson. For several years this was the poem I read daily to begin my prayers with God. It is the prayer that I read before I met with Hope's call committee. It is the prayer that I read when I accepted Hope's call as pastor. I entrust this piece of myself with you. Thank you for the ways you welcome and entrust yourselves to me. It is a precious gift.

Children's Ministry Dates - Mark your calendars!

With Madeline's departure, we are going to experiment with Sunday School again this coming spring. Rather than gather before or during worship, we will gather, parents and children together, one Sunday each month. Our hope is to plan these gatherings on the same day as the fellowship meal (the third Sunday, generally) so that everyone can also eat lunch. After the meal, we'll have some time with parents and children together and then split up into a time for parents together and a time for the kids together. Parents will talk about topics such as incorporating faith practices at home, talking with children about difficult topics in a faithful way, and more! Children will play, do art, or dive deeper into a Bible story together. The hope is that this will be an opportunity to build deeper relationships amongst both the adults and the children - something we have heard a desire for - as well as help support faith formation at home in addition to church.

Additionally, during worship, we will continue to have children's messages, activity bulletins for kids related to the story of the day, and other appropriately themed activities in the children's area each Sunday. Your children are an important part of our community and our worship life together.





The Baker and the Prince: Finding Devotion in Our Next Bread Bake

Our fall bread bakes have been a great success, not just for the delicious loaves produced, but for the inspiring connections made. In October we were honored to host **Jerry Jerabek**, a U of M graduate student who eagerly lent a hand, from shaping loaves indoors to baking at the wood-fired oven.

Jerry, who is busy preparing for high school history student-teaching, showed remarkable openness in spending a Saturday morning tackling a new skill with our seasoned team. His presence was a gift, and he shared something even more valuable over a warm slice of bread: a surprising link between his graduate research and our kitchen endeavors.

Jerry is researching the story of **Wenceslas**, including his commitment to personally providing the elements for Holy Communion. He shared a passage from one of his primary sources, *Legenda Christiani*, which beautifully describes Wenceslas's dedication:

“...during harvest time, in the deep still of night, he would go to his field together with his most faithful companion, about whom I shall later relate a special miracle that beautifully demonstrates both their merits. And having reaped the Wheat, he would carry it home on his own shoulders and grind it in a hand-mill. Being both baker and prince, he would sift the flour, and then, also during the night, he would go for water, drawing it with the words, ‘In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.’ And when he brought it home, he would mix it with fine flour and make wafers from it. And he would hasten to the vineyard, pick grapes, press them with his own hands, pour the wine into pitchers, and save it for use at the holy sacrifice.”

This historical account reminds us that the simple act of bread-making is truly an ancient, devotional endeavor.

President's Report

If you still read newspapers, you might have seen the Oct. 9 op-ed piece by the Rev. David Lose, pastor at Mount Olivet in Minneapolis. Pastor Lose is a friend of our congregation, having been a guest preacher in our pulpit. He also preached at the funeral of our former pastor, the Rev. Craig Shirley.

His commentary challenged one of my core beliefs: that we and our clergy should be publicly outspoken about the moral issues of our day. Pastor Lose was explaining why he had chosen not to add his name to the letter signed by hundreds of faith leaders (including Hope's pastors) urging a special legislative session to ban assault weapons and high-capacity magazines.

Pastor Lose's argument is nuanced, so I won't pretend that this is a comprehensive summary of his view, but only a glimpse: That he and his colleagues are "committed to preaching, teaching and leading in a way that will not give our members reason to fear that, if we knew how they voted, we might not welcome them to our fellowship." He referred to his position as "an attempt to offer an alternative to the current and increasingly violent us/them pull of partisan politics."

Reading his comments, I was troubled. Partisan politics? There may be partisan politicians involved, but efforts to make our schools and streets safer are bigger than politics. They are matters of right and wrong, of following Jesus' call to love our neighbors. The church can't abandon topics like climate change and racial equality – remember when they were considered uncontroversial? – just because a political party's leaders have decided to exploit them. We are called to be good stewards and to love our neighbors, no matter what.

But we are also called to welcome everyone into our community of faith. That's the admonition from Pastor Lose's commentary that I take to heart. Scripture says that nothing can separate us from the love of God. I hope and pray that no one among us fears being shunned for voting their conscience.

Treasurer's Report

November Financial Highlights

- General giving for November was \$47k. YTD totals are \$465k, 91% of the budgeted giving, a strong increase over October numbers.
- Income YTD totaled \$643k at 95% of the budgeted number. This number includes general giving, PEASE Academy rent and rental income; increased from last month's 91% of budgeted YTD.
- Expenses YTD totaled \$691k, which is just 2% above the budgeted amount, an improvement over October. The staff, V&G Board, and Facilities team continue to monitor these expenses.
- We continue to encourage ministry areas (Education, Hope in the World, Worship, Relational and Youth & Young Adult) to continue to utilize allocated funds for their dedicated purposes.

Our new Financial Administrator, Catherine Menick continues her efforts to reconcile accounts, catch up with overdue transactions, set up new ACH payments to improve payment efficiency, and move toward completion of our transition from Old National (formerly Bremer Bank) to Sunrise accounts.

Your support in supplying timely member pledges has been very much appreciated. We have received a strong response to the recent pledging campaign which allows for more accurate and reliable planning for next year's budget. The budgeting process is well underway, and I will be offering an overview of Hope's financial status and the proposed 2026 budget during the Adult Forum on Sunday, February 1. Please come with your questions and comments regarding our congregation's finances. Thank you again for your faithful support of our community and mission.
